The Reefline - Miami Beach

Miami's art scene has gone BYOS (bring your own snorkel). [Reefline](#) is an underwater sculpture park, snorkel trail, and hybrid reef located just off Miami Beach. Conceived by biocultural placemaker Ximena Caminos, the project first gained backing from the Knight Arts Challenge before securing a \$5 million, voter-approved Miami Beach bond in 2022. Nominated for Prince William's Earthshot Prize, Reefline brings together scientists, conservationists, architects, engineers, and artists to create a low-carbon installation that functions as a living coral reef, providing habitat for marine life. Architect Shohei Shigematsu of OMA masterplanned what will eventually become a seven-mile underwater corridor stretching north to Bal Harbour. The first artwork, *Concrete Coral*, by Argentine artist Leandro Erlich, was submerged 20 feet underwater last October. The installation takes the form of a subaquatic traffic jam: 22 full-scale cars embedded with Coral Lok technology to support the planting of some of the 2,200 corals being cultivated in Reefline's Coral Lab. Swimmers and free divers have already dubbed it a "mermaid playground." Future sections will feature works by Petroc Sesti, Carlos Betancourt and Alberto Latorre.

Flockhill - Craigieburn Valley, New Zealand

If you've ever wanted a national park to yourself, [Flockhill](#) comes close. The 36,000-acre historic sheep station, nestled in New Zealand's Southern Alps, has become one of the South Island's most coveted retreats. The original four-bedroom homestead is now joined by seven standalone villas, where wool throws, glowing fireplaces, and cozy indoor and outdoor living spaces open onto uninterrupted mountain views. At the heart of the lodge is Sugarloaf, an open kitchen and dining room led by New Zealand-born, European-trained chef Taylor Cullen, who returned home to run the property with his family. For the ultimate experience, book the Chef's Table, where Cullen and his team cook over an open flame using ingredients foraged nearby, grown in the garden, or drawn from the onsite "ferment library"—coprosma berries, edible pine, wild hare, venison, and eel among them. Beyond the table, the station and surrounding area are a playground for fishing, rock-climbing, horseback riding, and e-biking. Recovery comes at the new wellness spa, with sauna, cold plunge, and hot pool facing Sugarloaf Peak.

If you want to breathe some of the purest air on Earth—in a place with no access roads, towns, or hotels—head to Tasmania’s Southwest National Park for a new two-night [Port Davey Highlights cruise](#) from [On Board](#), a family-run expedition outfit. Tasmania, Australia’s island state, remains one of the most remote and protected destinations on the planet, and this compact itinerary makes it possible to experience Port Davey’s dramatic headlands, deserted beaches, and pristine waterways on a tight schedule. The journey begins in Hobart with a 40-minute seaplane flight above cinematic wilderness before landing in Bathurst Harbour, where guests board *Odalisque III*, a 12-passenger expedition vessel. Over three days, Tasmanian guides lead excursions to indigenous rock art sites and sea caves on remote islands, as well as rugged coastal hikes with a chance of spotting the endangered orange-bellied parrot. Back on board, guests retreat to the catamaran’s cushy lounge to snack on freshly baked raspberry-jam-and-vanilla-cream biscuits and sip Tassie wines and whiskies, before digging into chef-prepared feasts.
